I am applying for my third term on the Commission on Judicial Conduct as an attorney member. During my last few decades of practice, I have worked in different capacities on issues of access to justice and to strengthen the judicial system to better serve the public. My work on the Commission is an important part of that mission; it has been a true pleasure to work on important matters involving this bedrock institution in a collegial setting. Staying connected with the public on their interactions with the judiciary, even the many non-jurisdictional complaints (disagree with result, etc.), keeps the practice of law in perspective. Further, it reminds us of what the judicial process means to litigants, who generally only interact with the courts during periods of stress and anxiety. The discussions and effort to work through different perspectives among lay members, judges, and lawyers has provided me with new insights into our roles as attorneys and judges. Finally, if you were ever in doubt about merit selection as our judicial selection model, then contrasting the Alaska caseload to the cases presented in other states (often the states with elected judges, but not exclusively) where judges behave in ways unheard of in our state, militates strongly in favor of merit selection.

From an institutional perspective, there is a 2 year learning curve to become comfortable with the application of the Code of Judicial Ethics to the facts presented by complainants. To that extent, my continued service will allow me to use my experience on future matters. My colleagues recently elected me as Vice Chair, and I would like to serve my term in that office. And while 43 years of practice as an attorney may to some be a call to find something else to do; it has served me well in evaluating the matters that arise before the Commission. I would be honored to serve my third and final term.
